Phillip Aubrey Flowe, age 74, died on Sunday, December 19, 2010.

Born March 10, 1936, in Washington, DC, Phillip was the fourth of seven children born to Eugene and Lillian Flowe. He lived most of his life in the DC Metropolitan area. Phillip served in the United States Army until November 30, 1965. After being honorably discharged from the Army, he began working at Fort Meade Military base as a chef and was promoted very quickly to Manager of the

Culinary Department because of his concern for a healthier eating program which he implemented. He also worked as Manager of the Culinary Department at the Oak Hill Children's Center in Laurel, Maryland where he retired in 1993. After retiring from the Children's Center, he was employed as Deputy Chief Bailiff with the Prince George's County Circuit Court in Upper Marlboro, MD for the past seventeen years. Phillip was a dedicated member of the Mount Carmel Baptist Church and a longtime member of the Kiwanis.

Phillip is survived by his sister, Lillian Flowe-Divers (Ronald Divers), brother Lamont Flowe (Juanita Flowe), and a host of nieces, nephew, grand nieces/nephews and loved ones.
